We are pleased to share highlights from another inspiring quarter of the academic year 2026-27. Across classrooms, communities and institutions, our partner organisations continued to strengthen education systems, empower educators, nurture children, develop future leaders, and build stronger nonprofit governance.

Future Education Leaders

Our partner organisation, Teach For India concluded its largest Fellowship recruitment cycle with over 22,800 applications and launched its Summer Institute across Delhi, Pune and Bengaluru to prepare more than 600 Fellows. Fellows also organised joyful summer camps focused on literacy, numeracy and social-emotional learning for children this quarter.



Bold classroom vision

96 Champion Teachers from 15 principals from Delhi government schools co-created vision statements and participated in classroom observations and leadership sessions to strengthen joyful, child-centred classrooms with support of our partner organisation Kshamtalaya Foundation. Teachers identified focus areas across three domains: skills, knowledge, and mindset, linked to teaching practices, student needs, parental involvement, and school culture.

Compassionate Action

Our partner organisation The Karuna Practice, held a three-day Educator Preparation Workshop in partnership with Care to Action in Vijaywada. These workshops helped educators in developing experiential insights into the SEE Learning curriculum, framework, and pedagogy. They were able to engage more deeply with SEE Learning as the facilitators conducted the workshop in the local language and they left the workshop enthusiastic to try out the curriculum and activities within their classrooms to create compassionate learning environments.



Learning by doing

Some of the most meaningful lessons are learned through experience. Across initiatives of our partner organisation The Education Alliance, Simple Education Foundation and Kshamtalaya Foundation- children, educators, volunteers, and community members are discovering the power of learning by doing—whether through hands-on classroom activities, experiential workshops, community projects, or collaborative problem-solving.

Women Enterprise & Wellbeing Initiative

Our partner organisation, Gaia Empowerment Forum commenced Women Enterprise and Wellbeing Initiative with a comprehensive participant mobilization, assessment, and selection process across the three Delhi, Jhajjar and Saharanpur to identify women entrepreneurs with the motivation and potential to build sustainable enterprises.

A Connection that Became a Commitment



Save Missing Girls, a Board Governance Program (a program of India Leaders for Social Sector support by MIF) alum organisation, works on child safety and prevention systems at scale. As part of post-program advisory conversations that connect SPO founders with prospective advisers, this introduction evolved into a sustained collaboration that began entirely online, with Dilip.

Dilip retired from Amazon and relocated to Trivandrum from Seattle, drawn in part by the motivation and clarity these early conversations with the Missing Link Trust team had provided. Dilip has been officially onboarded as a Board Member of Save Missing Girls (Missing Link Trust) from April 2026.

In quarter 1 FY 2026-27, MIF supported 1.5 lakh beneficiaries and 42.6 million beneficiaries have been impacted since 2019 under MIF 2.0
